About Heritage Careers Week

Heritage Careers Week is a national, cross-sector week of activity to raise awareness of careers in the historic environment sector and tackle misconceptions. The week's aims and activity work towards the delivery of Priority 2 of the <u>Skills Investment Plan</u> (SIP), 'Attracting future talent and improving access'

Heritage Careers Week 2024 is taking place from Monday 28 October to Friday 1 November and the target age range is young people aged 12-25. This means that activity will be available to young people in schools, colleges, and those who are no longer in education.

Week Aims

1. Raise awareness among young people, parents, and educators of the breadth of roles and range of pathways available within the heritage sector while addressing common misconceptions.

2. Inspire young people to consider a career in heritage.

3. Encourage and support employers across the historic environment sector to engage with education.





How to use this toolkit

This toolkit contains a suite of resources to inform young people about roles in the heritage sector and to inspire them to purse a career in it. It helps young people, their teachers, parents, and/ or carers to explore and discover the range of jobs and entry routes into the heritage workforce.

Within this 'Toolkit', educators, parents, carers and young people will find activities and links to videos and online resources that can be inserted into lessons, explore routes into employment, or used to inform discussions about the breadth of careers available in heritage. Most resources and activities include a brief explanation, a link to the resource and suggested questions to follow up post-activity.

These resources provide great pre or post activity for the <u>DYW</u> <u>Live activity</u> for Heritage Careers Week 2024 on Thursday 31 October. The sessions will be recorded so you can add them to your classroom toolkbox and revisit them later in the year followed by your preferred activities in this booklet. The sessions focus focus on:


- 1. What is the Heritage Sector?


reflect on the roles you have learned about? Consider...

Are you interested in archaeology? Archaeology Scotland has a variety of interactive activities that can be used in your learning setting, including booklets, links and activity ideas for all ages and stages. Access them on the <u>Heritage Resources Portal</u>.

What will young people learn?

Each resource covers a different topic and supports the development of a range of skills and knowledge. Learning from archaeology is not limited to Social Studies but links to learning and skills development across the curriculum. Examples are:

- Developing math skills through stratigraphy
- Learning biology and science through osteoarchaeology
- Exploring geography and biodiversity through prehistory
- Developing creative and storytelling skills
- Discovering Scotland's Past



Marseum

Marseum is a free learning resource and lesson plan designed to help young people develop transferable skills, while learning about museums and galleries. It was created by Museums Galleries Scotland in collaboration with Daydream Believers.


The learning resource is designed as a teacher-led learning experience. **Marseum** is split into five sessions, approximately two hours long. You can learn more and download the resource through the <u>Daydream Believers website</u>. What will young people learn?

As part of the first human settlement on Mars, learners will help design a new exhibition for the first museum on the Red Planet. After learning about the purpose of museums, the Marseum team will create an exhibition to showcase stories from Earth to the young people of Mars.

Learners will develop their skills in teamworking, problem solving, and storytelling, among others. The resource will allow them to work creatively and to learn about different roles needed in the day-to-day of a museum.





Build Your Future



The programme combines practical workshops, talks and a suite of digital resources that pupils, parents and educators can access easily.




After reading through Emma's blogs, consider...
